Day 1 : participants will be given a chance to introduce themselves, their places of origin (barangays, tribes etc) ; actual circumstances that forced them to leave their communal abodes and seek refuge somewhere else.

They will be given exercises base on the field of interest (theater, arts or music) each participant has chosen.

At the end of the day they are expect ed to come up with their statement of hopes & aspirations based on justice, Peace and equality from lessons learned from the activities of the day.

SN JOSE DEL MONTE BULACAN

Day 1. : introduction of SDG to the participants and the workshops' rationale and objective/s. Whole morning will be spent on rapport-building group activities.

Day 2. : Each group will present their presentation based on the category they have chosen e.g., theater, arts or music. Reaction, questions, objections, clarifications from the participants will be allowed towards the presentations. In the afternoon the participants will be asked to come up with their group statement of hopes and aspirations as Filipinos based on justice, Peace & equality from lessons learned and realization they discovered during the two day activities.

SYLLABUS (2 Day Workshop)

Improvisation 1 : Participants will introduce themselves e.g. name, age, family status, number of kids, his/her job before where he/she is from (Barangay, Town) etc. accompanied by body movements describing his/her job

Improvisation 2 : Just like imp. 1 but this time their vocal narrations will be done in sing-song form.

Improvisation 3 : participants will be divided into 3 different groups where in each group will do imp. 2 only this time they will have make the presentation in the NOW context. And they will have to do it as a group.

From the result of the exercises mentioned above, the whole body will body will then choose 5 to 10 participants and come up with a 3 minute dance interpretation choreograph by them.





His numerous awards include the Alexander Onassis Foundation International Prize for Playwriting for *TUKOO! TUKOO*. the French Chevalier de l'Ordre des Arts et Lettres and Chevalier de l'Ordre National de Merit, Manila's Alagad ng Sining, UMPIL Alagad ni Balagtas, UP Chancellor's Most Outstanding Faculty and Most Outstanding Artist, Asian Cultural Council Award, and various Palanca Awards, among them for his works *TAONG GRASA* and *DEATH IN THE FORM OF A ROSE*. He continues to be an active lecturer, workshop panelist, visiting professor, director, designer, and librettist for productions. His works have been admired in Europe, USA, South America and Asia. His film on streetchildren *HINABING PAKPAK NG ATING MGA ANAK* was Official Selection of Window into Asia at Busan IFF. And won best film and director at the Chandler IFF and Toronto Diversity IFF. Critic and scholar Peter Holland writes: "Juan is among the most enthralling directors of the world...whose work powerfully speaks truth to power. "

Claudia Turbay Quintero Ambassador Embassy of Colombia to Ghana and 17 West African countries, Hon. Ela Gandhi Granddaughter of Mahama Gandhi Trustee, Ghandi Development TrustCo-President of Religions for Peace Hindu, South Africa, Mr. Nikola Burazer Programme Director, Centre for Contemporary Politics, Executive Editor, European West Balkans, Belgrade, Serbia and Mr. Astrit Istrefi Executive Director, The Balkan Forum Kosovo.

It was followed by a blended virtual commentating activity. 

Session 3 – HEALTHCARE REFORM and SUSTAINABLE TOURISM

1. Honorable Ignacio Sanchez Amor has delved into the current situation in the international

arena. According to him, we tend to focus more on implementing sanctions than treaties, which is alarming. Amor has emphasized the discussion on Cultural Diplomacy as a solution to the threats of international war. He has also cited the cause of the international dispute: the identity policies that defeat the multicultural world. Multicultural existence could be an excellent state in this time of post-COVID crisis. There is the racing of identity policies that exclude the multicultural perspective. Amor reiterated that cultural diplomacy has a vital role in this environment of post-covid scenario.

Amor also stated that Europe had tried its best to cope with the crisis through a creative vaccine, health, and economic policy. He asserted that there would be no post-COVID scenario won't work together. There should be a joint effort among nations, and an international theory on pandemics can be a great response to this post-COVID state. The world should put their knowledge altogether to avoid a pandemic situation. Amor further emphasized that the people need to support the Science approach since it is the most secure approach.

Another thing he cited is the solidarity among any developing country, which can be manifested by removing all the obstacles that may hinder the successful distribution of vaccines worldwide. A commitment on giving donations should also be sustained. He ended his discussion on promoting the One Global Health advocacy, which links the environment, human health, and animal health to prevent the transfer of the virus. He encouraged the world to create and incorporate this political agenda of "one health" with the United Nations, World Health Organizations, and the international arena.

2. Prof. Jesus de Salvador embarked on the history of the Manila Galleon and its significant role in humanity. He emphasized that the Manila Galleon serves as the lighthouse that will give light to the challenging roads of crisis and war. De Salvador

also mentioned the sustainable development goals to save the planet and humanity through arts and sciences. He added that for humanity to rise, science is necessary, and coordination of all institutions is essential. He ended his discussion with the notion that the way to resolve any crisis is to combine Science, Solidarity, and more international corporation.

3. Being one of the proponents of the Latin America Presidential Mission proponents, Salguero expressed her particular affection for the Philippines because of the mutual history linked with Spain and the Philippines. According to Salguero, she was amazed by the culture and history that the Philippines manifested. She was proud to discuss that central America is comprised of 600 million population with almost half of it being women. She added that to attain development, peace, and integration. Salguero emphasized that culture is the cement of our societies and that we can build many different bridges through it. She ended with the statement that the world should focus on unity rather than differences.
4. In his opening statement, Senator Bong Go recognizes the impact of covid 19 on the lives of many people all over the world. Senator believes that the arts and culture can help someone's recovery from different kinds of traumas caused by the pandemic. He also mentioned how the government responds through other health programs, initiatives, and projects to provide quality of life for Filipinos and improve the country's healthcare system. He encourages everyone to cooperate with various agencies and support the government's programs to attain sustainable development goals. He also cited some of the laws he authored to address the practical need of Filipinos. He refers to Malasakit Centers Act, which aims to put up Malasakit Centers in all DOH-run hospitals to give Filipinos convenient access to quality healthcare.
5. The Secretary expressed her hope that the Department of Tourism will soon recover from the losses caused by the pandemic. She ensures that the Department proposes programs that undergo careful planning to ensure the safety of the people and protect the environment. She also shares her perspective regarding the pandemic on how it helps the environment breathe and regenerate its resources. The closing of Boracay is the best example; as it undergoes rehabilitation for several months, it is now a model for sustainable tourism. She also mentioned the implementation of a three-month closed fishing season to allow new spawning of sardines, herrings, and mackerels in the Visayan sea.

New tourism circuits were developed from a different region in the country featuring either culture, culinary, arts, historical, or event religion that will promote holistic wellness of farm tourism. Hon. Puyat mentioned some of the initiatives of the Department to mitigate the effect of the pandemic.

6. The activation of Barangay Health Emergency Response Teams (BHERTs) is through the effort of DILG, which aims to give immediate assistance through the need of the barangay and to promote cooperation of local and national government. DILG Undersecretary Jonathan Malaya started his message with greetings and hope that soon, this pandemic will be over. He reminded us that we should not be complacent because there is still a virus threat. He proudly enumerates how the uniformed men responded when the pandemic started. Through a collaboration of local, national government, and other stakeholders, different programs to address the issues during the pandemic was successfully implemented. They even successfully teamed up with the Department of Health to assist its "BIDA ang may discipline" campaign. The said campaign was when different levels of quarantine restrictions were implemented. It only shows that becoming cooperative is the key to success. The DILG remains committed to cooperating with other agencies to give people service and improve their quality of life.
7. Dr. Chua showed in a short presentation the different Chinese dances, and he tells a description for each. Cross-cultural collaboration is his message, and this happens



According to him, the pandemic doesn't deter them from collaborating with others, and they use an online platform such as zoom to do that.

8. A short video of Teofredo Ted Esguerra was shown during the Program showing how deeply passionate he is in arts. Dr. Esguerra promotes indigenous knowledge and products such as medicinal plants for treatment.
9. Mr. Labad shared how the province of Bohol recovered from different calamities that hit the region, such as a strong typhoon that left the area devastated. He showed in the short presentation what the local government unit has done to reach every people during trying times. He emphasizes the importance of coordination of every agency and stakeholders in the stage of recovery. Another short video clip was presented to show how the arts and culture can help heal and promote resiliency among people in the province. Mr. Labad is proud to showcase the overwhelming beauty of Bohol that captured the heart of everyone to visit the place and to try their local products.
10. Mr. Al Tesoro shared some of their Program in the province of Capiz. Promoting the local product is one of the projects of the region as they launched the Program Manindahan |Ta! Mr. Tesoro is also proud to show how beautiful the province of Capiz is in a short video presentation featuring different tourist spots in Capiz. They also prioritize the product made by indigenous people in their region.

ULYSSSES OF GHANA PROJECT

SYNOPSIS

Docufiction Ulysses from Ghana is inspired by the play Slaves written by Ghanaian author Mohamed Ben Abdallah. Transatlantic trade, depicted in the play, marked one of the darkest pages in the recent history of the world. Docufiction also weaves into the story of the play commentaries of contemporary Ghanaians on novel forms of modern-day slavery, as well as vestiges of racial discrimination across the globe as illustrated in Black Lives Matter movement. The film looks at how catharsis can be reached, and whilst not forgetting the cruel treatment of slaves, it looks forward to a better world where prejudices will no longer prevail.

The creative team has assembled a fine group of actors linked with the Ghanaian Centre of the International Theatre Institute of UNESCO with support of the Government of Ghana. In 2019 Ghana marked 500 years of sending Ghanaian slaves to Virginia. It subsequently launched a campaign "The Year of Return" resulting in visits by about one million people, connecting thus West Africa with its diaspora, and encouraging those who wanted to retrace their roots to settle in Africa – the opposite of contemporary migration patterns

Following success of Ulysses from Ghana, which is now destined to be shown at major festivals across the world, a plan is drawn to shoot eight more docufictions in selected destinations in South and Central America, Africa, Asia and Oceania.

FEEDBACK AND REPORT ON THE RESILARTS EARTH-SAVING FESTIVAL MANILA, PHILIPPINES 3RD – 5TH APRIL 2022

INTRODUCTION: This is a report to indicate my experience as a delegate invited to perform and participate in the Resilarts Earth-saving festival that took place under the patronage of UNESCO-International Theatre Institute. The report is prepared by the participant, Swati Simha, who is an independent artist and activist and is presently associated with SSCC (South-South Co-operation Council) as a Youth Ambassador.

Cecile Guidote Alvarez was in-charge of the entire event and was accessible before and during the festival for any communication. The main person of contact from the organizing team was Dexjordi Lyle Sison and conducted most of the communication before and during the festival.

- I. **PLANING AND PREPERATION:** The event had been scheduled to take place in November-December 2021. However, it was delayed due to the pandemic and the organizers saw it fit to re-schedule the event to April 2022. I received an email invitation for the re-scheduled event on the 10th of March 2022.

Tickets: It was indicated that the ticket costs would have to be borne by the participant and the organizers were generous to offer to write letters to government departments for the sake of funding airfare.

However, there was not enough time to apply and wait for government funding and funds had to be arranged personally.

On interaction, I realised some participants' airfare was paid by the organizers. Clear indication of criteria for availing airfare can go a long way in facilitating exchange and dialogue.

VISA: Visa for my travel posed challenging. The bureaucratic measures put in place by the Philippines government for Indian citizens required more time for processing. Visa was eventually secured thanks to the persistent effort of Cecile Guidote Alvarez and her ability to connect with people in high office.

APPENDIX II-C-INTERNATIONAL DELEGATES FEEDBACK INDIA 2

NOTE: Few small things can go a long way in facilitating international travel.

- a) A notice and invitation at least 2 months prior to the date of travel would help plan, secure funds and visas more smoothly.
- b) Letters written with only the first name of participant was not considered valid by government agencies. First Name, Last Name, Address and where possible Passport number on invitation letters as a rule of thumb would greatly help international participants.
- c) Separate letters to embassies in different countries. Each addressed to the ambassador of only that embassy.

2. LOGISTICAL SUPPORT:

On arrival: I was told I would be escorted by a driver to the Hotel. However, there was some confusion and another participant (from Thailand) and I who arrived on the same flight, were waiting outside arrival for over an hour when a security personal decided to help us contact Manila Hotel drivers. Dexjordi Lyle Sison was available on call, however as we had just arrived, neither of us had a phone connection to contact him.

Accommodation & Meals: The Manila Hotel was comfortable and the staff very polite and professional. Meals were hygienic and formal.

Return: Dexjordi Lyle Sison accompanied me to get a PCR test done and Return transfer was hassle free.

3. FESTIVAL PROGRAM:

The schedule for the different events were shared digitally to us before arrival and the programs arranged by the organizers ran smoothly and was an enriching experience. The performances at Fort Santiago, Intramuros was unique and diverse.

The rehearsal time we had the day before the show was sufficient for our short performances and doing two runs gave us a good idea about the way things would proceed.

A 'spontaneous' group performance was planned. However, this was not an inter-cultural improvisation where each of us engaged creatively, rather, it was a choreographed group dance. Perhaps, it would have been a lot more exciting to allow creative expression and given us the evening to come up with something ourselves. This would have also allowed us to understand different performance vocabulary, how they can come together and how people from other parts of the world are thinking about SDGs and come to a more organic improvisation.

Film screenings and other small evening performances and the markets outside performance spaces were a welcome addition to the program.

4. OTHER COMMENTS

There was a general tendency of the organizers to encourage people to represent something 'exotic' and 'traditional' about their nations. Certain forms of 'national movement' and 'national costume' were also preferred. While some of us engage critically with the dominant cultures within our own nations, others had a more contemporary and modern approach to their performance which was more suitable to talk about contemporary issues outlined by SDGs. This need to have critically thinking participants do something exotic was disconcerting and a more robust discussion must follow this tendency and see if we need exotic dances and movements to talk about SDGs or if we need a more critically engaged vocabulary that may well emerge from traditional performance styles but seize to be exotic spectacles and serve to provoke thought.

Some participants felt uncomfortable about the repeated mention of the war in Ukraine in a manner that clearly condemned one side. Of course, one must not hesitate to condemn war anywhere in the world but organizers can be mindful of the precarities of artists representing their countries and its policies. Objections also came in the form of critique of how only some wars are talked about vociferously while others are often ignored.

a) CONCLUSION

My sincere thanks to all the organizers for inviting me and ensuring the smooth running of the festival.

I would like to make a special mention to thank Cecile Ma'am for sharing with us important aspects of running and organizing international festivals and how we can do the same in our own

REPORT ON THE SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT GOALS INTERNATIONAL RESILIART EARTH-SAVING FESTIVAL HELD IN MANILA, PHILIPPINES FROM 3RD TO 5TH APRIL 2022

1. INTRODUCTION

This report serves to give feedback on our experiences during the entire stay in the Philippines from 31st March 2022 to 7th April 2022. We generally had a pleasant stay in Manilla courtesy of the hospitality we received from the Filipinos. We never had a dull moment nor missed home.

Special mention goes to the Philippine Center of the International Theater Institute (ITI) represented by Cecile Evidote – Alvarez, Nilo Agustin, Dexjordi Lyle Sison and Marie Gil Suyat, The Manila Hotel staff, delegates to the festival and technical staff whom we interacted with daily on a personal basis for engaging with us warmly and professionally.

2. FEEDBACK

Please find below our feedback broken down into segments we hope would be helpful for future cross cultural engagements.

2.1 Logistical Support

We are pleased to say that there was no situation we were neither stranded nor unattended to. Logistical support was accorded to us satisfactorily as further explained below:

2.1.1. Airport Transfers

Our airport transfers were timely and professionally done to our expectations save for the delays encountered at the airport on arrival due to the Covid 19 induced protocols which we view as beyond the host's control. We had to undergo a time consuming manual verification of the One Health Pass leading us to spending close to two hours at the airport.

2.1.2. Accommodation & Meals

We had a Five Star stay at The Manila Hotel. The weather was fairly hot but we hardly experienced it as the hotel and other facilities were well air conditioned. We enjoyed the meals and the meal times were fairly conducive. However, we propose that cross cultural options be availed in future to cater for all especially for cross cultural events.

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2.1.3. Communication

This was well catered for. We had free Wi-Fi at the hotel and local sim cards were availed to us for ease of communication outside the hotel Wi-Fi.

2.1.4. PCR Testing

PCR test facilitation was done timely and fully paid for by the host. Transport to and from the centre was conveniently provided.

2.1.5. Transportation

Transport to rehearsals, performances, market was promptly availed. Nonetheless, support with airfares for all participants would be appreciated as some got it and others footed their own individual fees.

2.2. Festival Program

The program was shared well in advance thereby giving us ample time to mentally prepare for programs. No program ever caught us by surprise. All performances were well articulated in resonance with the SDGs theme. It was an eye opening experience as we learnt quite a lot. We benefited from the Global Goal 17; Partnerships for goals were:

1. On 2nd April 2022 at Fort Santiago, Intramuros, we ran a cultural heritage preservation exchange workshop on dance with children and young audiences which included dancers and the Earth Savers on the famous Mbakumba dance which is popular among the Karanga people from Masvingo Province, Zimbabwe with song, background history and dance movement by Getrude Vimbayi Munhamo – Pfumayaramba and drumming and movement choreography by Tawanda Pfumayaramba. The Mbakumba dance is traditionally performed after harvest and for entertainment purposes.
2. Getrude Vimbayi Munhamo – Pfumayaramba performed a Tertulia of Music, Dance, Poetry, Puppetry and Indigenous Bazaar directed by Anton Juan.
3. Getrude Vimbayi Munhamo – Pfumayaramba participated in a joint invocation with Maria from The Philippines to open up the Afro-Asia Night on 3rd April 2022.
4. Tawanda Pfumayaramba participated in a performance by Mr Vin Makara, the clown from Cambodia.
5. Getrude Vimbayi Munhamo – Pfumayaramba participated in a Cross-Cultural Collaborative Showcase with other delegates from Bangladesh, Brazil, Cambodia, India, Indonesia, Japan, Philippines, Spain, South Korea and Thailand.

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Indeed through partnerships, great ideas can be sown and cultivated to the achievement of great deeds that will in turn make this world a better place for all.

2.3. Rehearsals

The rehearsal space met our expectations and the tech rehearsal went on well. However the following shortcomings where encountered with regards the dress rehearsal;

1. Water use on stage was prohibited; and
2. Correct props were not timely availed.

We are however grateful that the sound team managed to fuse in sound and lighting effects much to our satisfaction. The team was indeed cooperative to work with. We further propose that engagements be done well in advance so that an appropriate venue and props are secured in relation to required specifications of a theatre piece.

2.4. Performance

The performances went well. The administration team eventually managed to source the correct props before the show. For future engagements, we propose for the payment of performance fees especially bearing in mind that with our case, were we failed to secure partnership to meet our travelling costs.

2.5. Cultural Exchange

We acknowledge receipt of a book, Ballesteros on My Mind My Hometown in the Philippines, Festival Souvenirs in the form of branded coffee mugs, notepads and lanyards. We are truly grateful.

Further to that, we thank Mr Dexjordi Lyle Sison for gifting us with a Philippines souvenir, exposing and treating us to street cuisines and accompanying us to market tours.

Even though the program was tight, we would have appreciated a whole day dedicated to cultural exchange where delegates would have been exposed to cultural heritage tours for the benefit of exchange in historic background of countries respectively. Further to that, cross cultural diplomacy sessions or symposiums by the host for and with the delegates would be helpful to enhance exchange and skills transfer.

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3. CONCLUSION

Our sincere gratitude goes to the organisers (Philippine Center of the International Theater Institute), financiers, service providers, fellow delegates and all participants for according us the opportunity to showcase our craft at this successful festival.

February 22, 2022 – I visited my hometown Bohol to meet the Chairman of the Music Theater Now Network Committee of the International Theater Institute and the Founding Artistic Director of Kasing Sining, Mr. Lutgardo Labad to formally invite them into the continuation of the SDGs ResiliArt Earthsaving Manila Event and discussed the possible collaboration with the Bohol Kasing Sining members. We are supposed to have an Outreach Program in Bohol last December but due to the Omicron surge, the second half of the SDG program in December 2021 was moved this March to April 2022. Due to the massive damage of typhoon Odette and required prolonged rehabilitation efforts. The concept of the Bohol Outreach was shifted to by inviting creative team from Kasing Sining of Bohol instead of bringing the delegates to Bohol as originally planned in December 2022. It would serve the same objective of interaction with the foreign artists with their experience in Manila shared with the Bohol Cultural Community supported by Gov. Arthur Yap. During my visit to Sir Gardy's place in Baclayon, Bohol, I also had a chance to meet Mr. Marvin Ablao (Actor/Choreographer), Mr. Jerrey David Aguilar (Program Director of Laum Bohol/Artistic Director of Kasing Sining), Mr. Joseph Dalope (Actor/Public Servant) and Ms. Jed Medrano (Writer/Director/Producer at FBN Media).

Kasing Sining is a community-based semi-professional repertory theater company aimed at the development of theater in Bohol.

From 1996 to 2001, it served as a cultural organization supported by the Provincial Government of Bohol. From 2002, it has remained independent and relies on grants and community support for its productions. Its original membership was close to forty artists during the first phase of its history, coming from different sectors of the Tagbilaran Community, but since then, Teatro Bol-anon has a flexible core of artists, fluctuating from ten to twenty performers and staff, depending on the requirements of the project.

Since 2009, when TEATRO BOL-ANON led in the development of community theaters in Bohol as an artistic training core, it helped shaped the formation of community-based cultural collectives established to provide relevant cultural entertainment to tourists and visitors as a form of social enterprise in the field of cultural tourism. These groups are: the Maribojoc Punta Cruz Cultural Collective, the Anda Cultural Collective, the Batuan Cultural Collective, and the Abatan River Development Management



Its major and most notable productions mounted since 1996 include: Dagon sa Hoyohoy (Life of Boholano hero Francisco Dagohoy), Hanas/ Birtuso, Ang Tagbalantay, Sandugo Oracles, Karaang Balay, and Oktubre 15 Memoirs of a People's Faith.

When the deadly earthquake hit Bohol on October 15, 2013, resulting in a massive loss and ruin of historical churches and homes, TEATRO BOL-ANON developed in collaboration with national agencies like PETA and the NCCA, programs and activities which will aid in the cultural restoration and rehabilitation of impacted communities through psychosocial support using the arts and the theater. This ARTS FOR HEALING AND REHABILITATION Program has been called KASING SINING (Sining nga naay Kasing-kasing, or Art with a Heart).

With this mandate responding to the new historical situation in Bohol, and providing a more regular season of plays aimed at evolving a process for sustainability, its founder Gardy Labad has decided to rebuild a new TEATRO BOL-ANON with a fresh and new membership, with a reinvigorated program of training and creation, to be based in the cockpit of his hometown of Baclayon. This new repertory group is now christened the KASING SINING TEATRO BOL-ANON ENSEMBLE.

Its maiden performance took place February 2015 for the National Arts Month, with the the production TEATRO PORVENIR, a specially edited back-to-back staging of two Palanca drama winners: Edward Perez's TEATRO PORVENIR (Life of Andres Bonifacio circa 1887-1889), and Tim Dacanay's TEATRO PORVENIR (Life of Andres Bonifacio and the History of the Philippine Revolution circa 1892-2002). Supported by the community with assistance from the National Commission for Culture and the Arts (NCCA), the Province of Bohol, and the Community of Baclayon, the production employed the use of ritual and dance movements from the tradition of the Boholano komedya or linambay, arnis, pangalay, and kuntao. Its unique performance space inside the Baclayon cockpit was a historical first in the creative and adaptive re-use of a traditional cultural structure.
